#### HERE'S HOW IT WORKS - - -

your Partnership Steward creates a contacts group which includes you (once you agree and provide your email). When a lonesome player phones the Partnership Steward looking for a game, Partnership Steward will then email all players on their contact list. You then contact Lonely player whose details will be provided in the email and arrange a game.

This can lead to a match made in heaven with possibly 60%+ successes.

When I checked our positions, I went dry in the mouth - we'd been assigned Table One, North and South.
With two Grand Masters sitting East West, all that we'd learned would be put to the test.

We took our positions and said not a word, but I'm certain our heartbeats could surely be heard. We'd been to some lessons, so although I was green, I knew that to open you needed thirteen. I sorted my hand and counted but alas, with a mere ten points, I had to pass. And frankly I thought, this a shame, as I'd never before had 13 spades in a game!

My lefthand opponent, a big name in the city, opened two clubs and I thought what a pity.

My partner South who was trembling with fear, bid two hearts in print very clear.

My righthand opponent sat straight in their chair - and promptly three diamonds they chose to declare.

Now I had a fair suit, but alas, with no help from partner, I had pass.

My left hand opponent now bids three spades - you can imagine how much I was amazed! South bid four hearts and now I feared, that I can't play partner's suit if I end up on lead. My righthand opponent studied their hand and soon Six No Trumps was the command. It was my turn to bid; after pass, pass and pass then my partner went double. Oh no, I thought, we're in terrible trouble.

I was ready to lead, a spade was my choice, but alas, my partner got it wrong and led the heart King.

A lead out of turn - what a terrible thing!

The director was called and I can still hear the voice as declarer was told to make their own choice.

A heart lead you see, as I'm sure you know, would help set up my partner's strong hand.

So declarer turned to me looking ever so smart, lead any suit but don't lead a heart!

So of course I led the forth of my spades - I guess this was a reasonable lead that I made.

Because from thereon I didn't lose the lead and our opponents had to concede,

Thirty-five hundred which seemed like a lot - we later found out this score was a top!
